

MISSION

TO EMPOWER, THROUGH EDUCATION, THE PEOPLE OF MALAWI TO BECOME AGENTS OF DEVELOPMENT FOR THEIR FAMILIES, COMMUNITIES, COUNTRY AND WORLD.



OUR PROGRAMS



- Assists with upkeep and school supplies to sponsored students, as well as emergency medical expenses for illness.
- Hosts term meetings at the D2D campus with all sponsored youth.

RESIDENTIAL YOUTH

- House vulnerable youth on campus in a family-like environment with three nutritious meals a day.
- Provide needed school materials (books, uniforms, backpacks, school shoes).
- Provide upkeep supplies (soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, deodorant)
- · Provide medical care and enrichment activities.
- Residential youth are given responsibilities and leadership opportunities within the house.
- Host yearly meetings at the D2D campus with all guardians.

GIRLS' EMPOWERMENT

This initiative includes two structured extracurricular activities for sponsored female youth and elementary-aged girls:

- **Girls Club**: Afterschool program designed to provide girls with the tools necessary to rise above obstacles and continue their education.
- Income Generating Activity: Provides a sustainable way for high school girls to earn pocket money to support themselves while they finish their education, while also cultivating a sense of responsibility. Trainings are held to prepare members with necessary business skills.

EXTENDED LEARNING

- Provide tutoring sessions each Saturday at the D2D campus, taught by sponsored students in their gap year before tertiary education.
- Offer educational environmental activities, such as on-site animal husbandry, reforestation and garden maintenance
 activities to promote skills training, provided each Saturday for sponsored students.
- Host annual leadership workshop for all sponsored youth before the beginning of each school year.

LOCAL EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

- Provides operational support for 4 local nursery schools, which were established by D2D in conjunction with the community.
- Provides infrastructural, administrative and academic support for the local elementary and high schools.
- Provides infrastructural support for Wasambo Education Foundation and Wasambo Boys High School, which is commissioned by D2D in conjunction with the community.





To provide youth with the opportunity to access and complete their education by removing the financial barrier to tuition and schooling costs.

- 75 percent of individuals in our area are under 25 years of age.
- Only 5 percent of girls and 10 percent of boys complete high school education in our district.
- Only 15 percent of students transition from primary school to high school. Even less go on to complete higher education.
- 1,980 Malawian youth supported since D2D's inception.
- 272 students were provided access to secondary education.
- 33% of sponsored youth went to boarding school.
- 31 sponsored youth attend universities



To provide the opportunity for vulnerable youth to concentrate on their education and personal development and become change makers in society by providing a safe, supportive, and structured family-like environment that connects youth to a larger world while protecting them from harmful cultural ideas and practices.

- Over 1 million children in Malawi are orphaned.
- 20 percent of Malawian households look after vulnerable youth, many of which lack the means to provide their family members with basic necessities.
- Only 6 percent of orphans in Malawi receive educational support.

- 54 youth found their home at D2D's residential house.
- D2D residential youth reported feeling more stability than in their home environment.
- Residential youth spent 180 hours in supplementary tutoring sessions.
- 90 percent of residential youth sitting for national exams received passing scores.



To strengthen girls' agency in current and future decision making through positive role modeling, skills attainment, and educational support so that they advocate on their own behalf and collectively for other girls in their community, while positively contributing to development.

- 25 percent of women in our area are illiterate.
- 3 out of 5 girls in our district reported early marriage as their reason for dropping out of high school.
- 50 percent of girls in Malawi are married before their 18th birthday.
- 40 percent of female teens in our area have already begun childbearing.
- 121 elementary and high school aged girls regularly attended D2D Girl's Club and remained in school, lowering their risk for pregnancy and early marriage.
- 24 home visits were made to families to discuss the importance of education.
- D2D sponsored girls spent 350 hours running a youth-led income generating activity.
- 26 girls were trained in the production of reusable menstrual pads.



To create global citizens by presenting sponsored youth with both formal and informal education frameworks that increase knowledge, skills, and opportunities.

- Only 50 percent of students who take the Malawi national exams (MSCE) pass, this exam is the key to future university enrollment and employment.
- The average pupil to teacher ratio in Malawi is 99:1.
- Deforestation rates in the northern region are the highest in the country at 3.4 percent.
- Unsustainable natural resource use is costing the country the equivalent of 5.3 percent of GDP each year, more than the total funding allocated to education and health in 2009.
- 270 sponsored students attended a three-day leadership conference hosted by D2D.
- 90 hours of tutoring sessions and informal life skills lessons were held for sponsored students.
- 100 percent of D2D sponsored students received environmental conservation education.



To support community driver educational assets, especially schools, that serve the larger community and include government, village, and nonprofit partners.

- Only 30 percent of children in Malawi complete elementary school.
- Only 20 percent of students are selected from primary to secondary school because there are not enough schools in Malawi.
- Schools in Malawi have limited resources and often lack necessities like adequate supply of teachers, textbooks and facilities.

- Due to our nursery school program implementation, there was an 80 percent increase in nursery school attendance.
- 250 children attended D2D's four partnering nursery schools in the community.
- 8 Early Childhood Development Instructors were trained in class management, community engagement, and relationship building.
- 4 local schools were provided with administrative support.
- D2D staff collaborated with School Management Committees to create education related rules and laws for surrounding communities to protect students.

PARTNER PROJECT

WASAMBO EDUCATION FOUNDATION

Wasambo Boys High School (WBHS) is run by the Wasambo Education Foundation, a Malawian contingent of traditional authorities, the District Education Manager, Wasambo Boys High School's Head Teacher and Director, Head Teachers from neighboring secondary schools and other dedicated education professionals.

In 2019, teachers participated in: Professional development sessions focused on student centered pedagogy, classroom culture, strong lesson planning and educational technology. In 2019, with D2D support, Wasambo Boys High School added:

- Seven new teachers
- 55 new students
- Staff Office
- Computer Lab
- Dormitory (In Progress)
- Borehole to increase student and staff access to water

In 2019, 149 students participated in:

- 175 hours of small group tutoring
- 110 hours of educational clubs, such as wildlife and environment, entrepreneurship, computer, logic and puzzle, traditional music and dance, science, debate, and chess
- 600 hours of structured study time


WASAMBO SCHOLARS

With each incoming class, 10 percent of enrollment is offered as full scholarships to top-scoring students living within the surrounding villages, ensuring that the school is accessible to the communities served by D2D. These students are selected for their academic performance, as well as their leadership and teamwork skills. The Wasambo Scholars, who most often come from homes without running water or electricity, consistently rank in the top tier of their class.

"My name is Cyrus and I am in my second year at Wasambo Boys High School. I am coming from a poor family and my parents could not manage to pay my school fees. My parents are excited that I have earned a full scholarship and that I can attend a school as good as WBHS. My favorite things about attending WBHS are the teachers who are very well trained and work hard, and also the campus. We have very nice views of Chombe Plateau and Lake Malawi. Sometimes, we get to visit the lake and swim during the school term. Thank you for supporting Wasambo Boys High School and all of the Wasambo Scholars. SOLOMON VISITS THE US

It was a very exciting moment when I first learned that I was chosen to go on the trip to the United States. I never thought that I would have this particular experience in my life, it was just so exciting. We visited Cleveland, Dayton and Columbus in Ohio. as well as Milwaukee and Chicago. Chicago was my favorite because the buildings were tall and beautiful, and seeing The Bean was just very cool. This year in Girls Club, we started a business group raising and selling chickens. I have cared for chickens before but never 200 at the same time! We had many lessons in which we learned about keeping chickens healthy and how to do business. We do not have business classes in school so it was very interesting to learn about what makes a business successful. I would care for the chickens a few times a week, either in the morning or in the afternoon. All of the girls had a specific time to come feed and clean. I liked the business group very much because I learned business skills and was able to buy things for myself with the money we made. I got some materials like sanitary pads, notebooks, and lotion. My favorite part was being in a business with all of my friends.

I'M A GRADUATE!


